Prevent Risk Assessment 2025-2026

CONTEXT

As part of PREVENT duty our risk assessment identifies current local, national, global political context as well as vulnerabilities of individuals and groups of society who are at increased risk or radicalisation.

At Wren Park we adopt the same vigilance as with other Safeguarding matters with an “**it could happen here**” approach. Staff being vigilant to signs and symptoms of radicalization and changes in children’s behaviour is an important part in PREVENTing crime, terrorism and further safeguarding and security issues. Our work to PREVENT radicalisation is proactive and ongoing, making use of Picture News, our British Values Scheme of Work, PSHE, SMSC and pastoral support help us to influence children positively and where we identify a concern, an appropriate response is needed.

In 2024 there are increased tensions around the world and within communities. These include but are not isolated to:

- War between Russia and Ukraine (with political involvement from UK, other European Countries and USA).
- Recent escalation in conflicts in the Middle East igniting tensions within the region and in UK.
- Ongoing risk of Islamist extremism and far right-wing stances taken by some individuals and groups within Derby City, Derbyshire and East Midlands.
- The effect of Covid and lockdowns has led to children having increased opportunities to be exposed by inappropriate online influencers without checks and measures or support of the school community and curriculum.
- Covid has also resulted in some children being disillusioned and marginalised thus putting them at increased risk or radicalisation as well as becoming involved in Criminal Related Exploitation / Activity.

An appropriate and quality curriculum, positive relationships across school, as well as early identification and support for children is essential to our strategy in developing children with well-being and healthy views to engage successfully within Modern Day Britain

Partnership and engagement	Pupils/staff	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Headteacher, as Designated Safeguarding Lead, responsible for oversight of updates to SLT, staff and governors through updates from DCSB (Derby Children's Safeguarding Board) ➤ The Safeguarding policy clearly reflects the school's duty towards Prevent and has been ratified by governors and is available for parents ➤ All staff and governors are aware of the factors that make an individual vulnerable and have a good awareness of stereotypes and know their duty and how to report a concern as part of safeguarding procedures in school ➤ In the same way as the school has always taken safeguarding seriously, we take this (as an element of safeguarding) seriously and the Headteacher and SLT members, are fully aware of the actions to take and who to contact in the event of concern ➤ All governors, staff and parents know to contact in the event of any Safeguarding concern. ➤ The Headteacher is aware of who to share information with regarding the Prevent duty. ➤ Staff are made aware of the Derbyshire Police PREVENT webpage for advice and further contact.
Welfare and pastoral support; Monitoring arrangements	Children and families	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ There is a clear system of pastoral care and referral ➤ School works effectively with families and other agencies in order to improve outcomes for children ➤ The Headteacher provides appropriate guidance and challenge to parents, staff and pupils who express racist, extremist, homophobic or other views and opinions contrary to the inclusive values promoted by the school. ➤ These are instilled in the curriculum and the ethos of the school (be respectful) ➤ The school performs an annual DCC safeguarding audit and is subject to Ofsted monitoring if inspected.

Online Safety	Children, staff and parents	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ The school has a robust firewall and filtering program that is monitored by the school smoothwall, DSL, SBM and technician-individuals accessing concerning materials can be identified and support provided. ➤ Online safety guidance (from the National College) is shared frequently via Class Dojo. ➤ School communicates clearly to parents and pupils about potential risks posed by online activity, including the use of various social media platforms on a regular basis through , newsletters and other communications should a proactive or responsive measure become appropriate
